As of spring 2020, Minnesota constituents across the state are talking about public policy items in particular, including infrastructure, economic and workforce development, access to education and transportation services, and preservation of natural resources.

EDUCATION

MN has **116** colleges and universities.

27% increase in apprenticeships in MN between 2014 and 2017.

AGING POPULATION

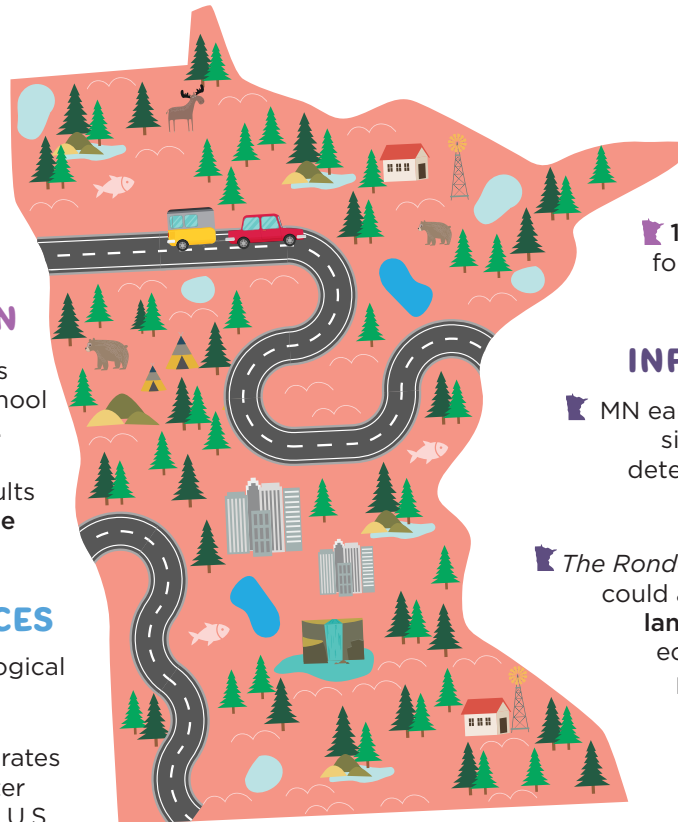
MN will have more adults over 65 than children in school for **the first time in history**.

The number of older adults (65+) is expected to **double** between 2010 and 2030.

NATURAL RESOURCES

MN is home to four ecological provinces (bioregions).

The Chippewa band operates one of the largest freshwater commercial fisheries in the U.S.



WORKFORCE

23,000 of MN immigrants describe themselves as **entrepreneurs**.

1 in 10 MN workers are foreign-born as of 2019.

INFRASTRUCTURE

MN earns a **“C” grade** which signals general signs of deterioration and requires attention.

The *Rondo Land Bridge Project* could add **20+ acres of new land** and be a significant economic development project for the region.
